Delta College's At-Risk Program is staffed by an Advisor (M. Carter) and a Student Development Specialist (S. Chandran). In 2006-07, the following services were provided: 1) 318 students received counseling/advising services; 2) 8 students used Plato; 3) 122 students participated in the Productivity Environmental Preference Survey; 4) 942 students received tutoring; 5) 1,138 students received Structured Learning Assistance services; 6) 68 students participated in Study Groups in Math and Nursing; 7) 15 student athletes participated in weekly study sessions; and 8) 20 students participated in a new program workshop. As the year progresses, faculty continue to make referrals and students are asked to meet with staff for identification/review of barriers to success, academic and/or counseling support, reassessment of course load, reestablishment of short and long term academic and career goals. At-Risk funding also provides individual and group peer tutoring in most subject areas on campus.</p>

CSS services include faculty and peer tutoring plus ESL instruction as well as accommodations to students with all types of disabilities including learning disabilities. Tutoring usage continues to increase. Overall, 78% of students using CSS, peer tutoring, special needs or special populations services earned a GPA of 2.0 or higher in both fall and winter semesters.</p> <p>Retention for DE students from fall to winter continues at 74%, comparable to the overall JCC average of 76%. The persistence rate from 05FL to 06FL was 50%, slightly lower than the institutional average (54%).</p> <p>Special Needs students passed at a rate (74%) that matches the overall institutional rate. Academic advisors reviewed COMPASS, ASSET and ACT placement test scores in English, reading, and math with students during the intake interview. Sometimes academic advisors needed to advise students to commit a semester to academic skills building in the KCC developmental program before beginning college-level work or to take a combination of developmental courses along with college-level courses. The academic advisors referred many at risk students and students with disabilities to the Special Populations program, the Student Support Services program, or the Tutoring Coordinator for academic assistance and/or academic accommodations. Grant funds are also used to fund the part-time Assessment Coordinator position and to pay for Compass test units and license fees. The At-Risk grant also funds our part-time Learning Assistance Coordinator position and our tutoring for at-risk students at all campus sites. In addition to these services, the grant also funds a position for an At-Risk Student Success Coordinator who meets with students who place into multiple areas of developmental education and with students whose GPA indicates that they are not making satisfactory academic progress. At-Risk funds were also used for service contracts and to purchase additional licenses to accommodate expanded use of Plato software in writing classes.</p>
